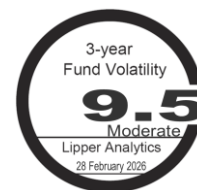
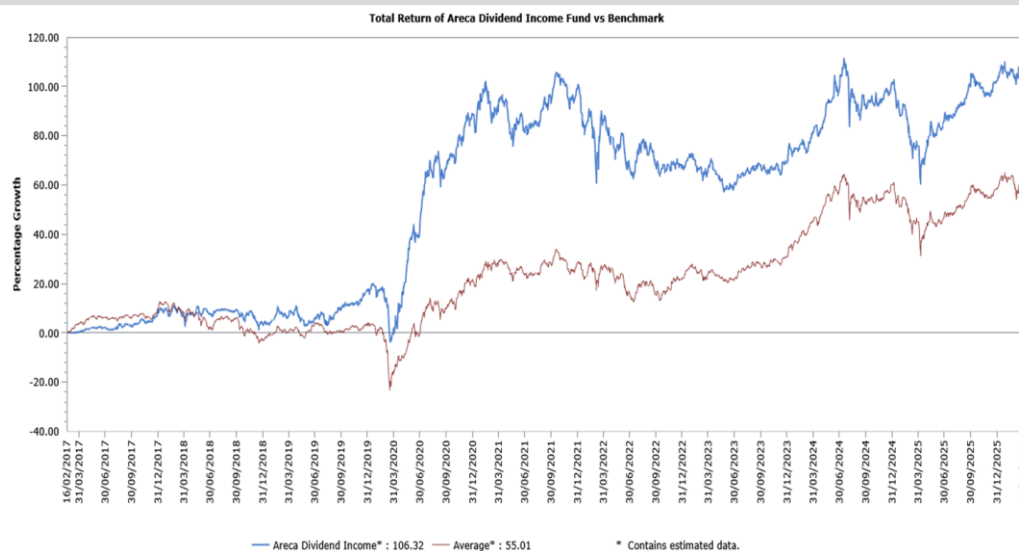

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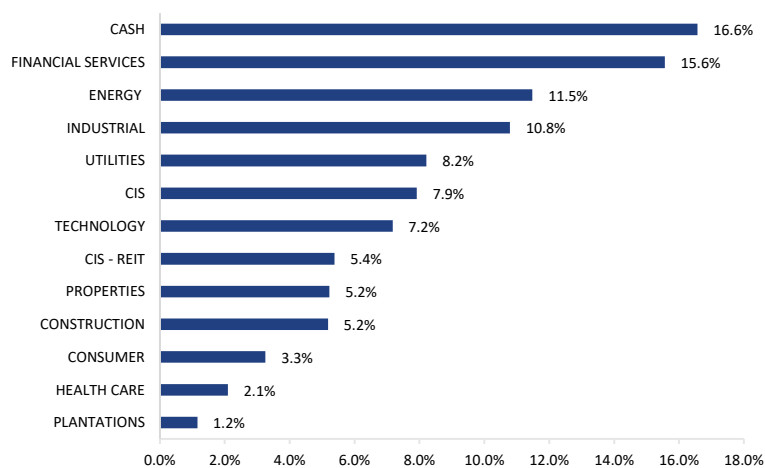

FUND MANAGER'S REPORT

The FBM KLCI declined 1.5% to close at 1,690 points in March 2026. Foreign investors posted their first month of outflows for the year in March, with a net sell of RM42 million (Feb 2026: RM171 million).

Malaysian equities declined amid escalating geopolitical tensions in the Middle East, which drove Brent crude oil prices sharply higher to as much as US\$118 per barrel following the prolonged closure of the Strait of Hormuz. Market sentiment weakened in the early part of the month before staging a brief recovery in the third week, supported by the strong listing debut of Sunway Healthcare Holdings. However, gains proved short-lived, with the market easing again towards month-end.

Domestically, the MADANI Budget 2026—the first under the 13th Malaysia Plan (RMK13)—anchors the next growth phase on fiscal discipline, inclusivity, and reform. With RM470bn in expenditure, a 3.5% fiscal deficit target, and reform-led revenue measures, the framework strengthens policy credibility while sustaining domestic demand through targeted subsidies and infrastructure investment. Foreign equity ownership in Malaysia also remains at historical lows, creating meaningful room for foreign inflows.

The Fund will continue to hold high-quality dividend yield names, particularly in financials, domestic REITs and utilities, while selectively accumulating oversold stocks during periods of weakness, focusing on companies with strong fundamentals and future-ready themes. The fund has also tactically positioned on energy names amid the US-Iran tensions. Valuations remain compelling, with the FBM KLCI trading at ~16.1x PER, still below its long-term average.

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
